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Independent Auditor's Report

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Police Pension Fund of the City of Lancaster, as of and for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, and the related notes to the financial statements, as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audits to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Police Pension Fund of the City of Lancaster, as of December 31, 2013 and 2012, and the changes in the financial position thereof for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Emphasis of Matter

As discussed in Note 1, the financial statements present only the Police Pension Fund and do not purport to, and do not, present fairly the financial position of the City of Lancaster, as of December 31, 2013 and 2012, the changes in its financial position, or, where applicable, its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our opinion is not modified with respect to this matter.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Management has omitted the Management's Discussion and Analysis that accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires to be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such missing information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. Our opinion on the basic financial statements is not affected by this missing information.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the schedules of funding progress and employer contributions on page 8 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audits of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information or provide any assurance.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

YEARS ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2013 AND 2012

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

General

The Police Pension Fund (Fund) is a single-employer public employee retirement system established and administered by the City of Lancaster, Pennsylvania (City), to provide pension benefits for employees of its Bureau of Police. The Fund is considered part of the City's financial reporting entity and is included in the City's financial reports as a pension trust fund. The accompanying financial statements do not include any other funds of the City and, therefore, do not present fairly the financial position and the changes in financial position of the City in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis of Accounting

These financial statements are prepared using the accrual basis of accounting. Police Pension Plan (Plan) member contributions are recognized as revenues in the period in which the contributions are due. Employer contributions are recognized when due and the employer has a formal commitment to provide the contributions. Benefits and refunds are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the terms of the Plan.

Investments

Investments are recorded at fair value. Securities traded on a national exchange are valued at quoted market prices.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date.

Net appreciation in fair value of investments includes both realized and unrealized gains and losses.

Use of Estimates

The process of preparing financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the use of estimates and assumptions regarding certain types of assets, liabilities, additions to net position restricted for pension benefits, and deductions from net position restricted for pension benefits. Such estimates primarily relate to unsettled transactions and events as of the date of the financial statements. Accordingly, upon settlement, actual results may differ from estimated amounts.

2. PLAN DESCRIPTION AND CONTRIBUTION INFORMATION

Plan Description

The Plan is a single-employer defined benefit pension plan that covers all full-time members of the City's Bureau of Police. The Plan provides retirement, disability, and death benefits to Plan members and their beneficiaries. Plan provisions are established and may be amended through the collective bargaining process.

Contributions

Plan members hired on or before January 1, 2011 are required to contribute 5% of lieutenant's pay (or actual pay, if higher) and longevity, plus \$5.00 per month for the service increment. Plan members hired on or after January 1, 2011, contribute 5% of base pay and longevity, plus \$1.00 per month for the service increment. The City is required to make actuarially determined periodic contributions at rates that, for individual employees, increase over time so that sufficient assets will be available to pay benefits when due.

The annual required contribution is determined annually during the budgeting process. The results of actuarial valuations are used in budgeting for future years.

The City contributed \$2,427,282 and \$1,718,841 to the Plan for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

Administrative Expenses

Administration costs are financed through investment income.

The January 1, 2013 actuarial valuation used the entry age normal actuarial cost method. The actuarial assumptions include: a) 8.00% investment rate of return, b) a projected salary increase of 5.00%, c) level dollar closed amortization method, and d) 13-year remaining amortization period. The actuarial value of assets for the Plan from the prior valuation report (reduced for benefits paid and increased for contributions) is projected forward at an artificial investment return of 7.00% (interest rate assumption minus 1%). In no event is the actuarial value of assets allowed to be greater than 120% or less than 80% of market value.

Custodial Credit Risk. Custodial credit risk is the risk that the financial institution or the counterparty to an investment transaction will fail and the government will not recover the value of the investment or collateral securities that are in possession of an outside party. The Fund does not have an investment policy for custodial credit risk. All of the Fund's investments are uninsured, registered investments for which the securities are held by the broker or dealer, or by its trust department or agent in the Fund's name.

Concentration of Credit Risk. The Fund places no limit on the amount the Fund may invest in any one issuer. At December 31, 2013, none of the Fund's investments were more than five percent of the Fund's total asset value.

Credit Risk. The Fund does not have a formal policy that would limit its investment choices with regard to credit risk. The Fund's money market and fixed income investments had the following level of exposure to credit risk as of December 31, 2013:
